(30 – 45 minutes)

What is Vision 2020?

❖ The Assembly Committee on the Way Forward recommended to the 222nd General Assembly (2016) that the Co-Moderators name a "2020 Vision Team" of fifteen people to develop a guiding statement for the denomination and make a plan for its implementation with all deliberate speed. The process of developing such a guiding statement will help us to name and claim our denominational identity as we seek to follow the Spirit into the future.

Engaging the Word¹

Opening

- ❖ Habakkuk: 1:1 2:3 (With specific attention to: 2: 2 & 3)
- ❖ Matthew 25: 31 46
 - o First read the passage (out loud) and just listen.
 - Second reading (out loud)², grab pencil or pen. As you listen to the passage again:
 - Listen again for God's action or voice.

- Look for or a Word or phrase that pops-out. Make note by underlining or drawing.
- Write down questions and ways these texts inform your understanding of vision.
- How do these texts inform who God is calling you/us to be?
- Prayer of thanksgiving.

Engaging the draft Guiding Statement

- With a copy of the draft Guiding Statement in front of you, think-back to the Engaging the Word opening exercise.
- ❖ Using the same process, read³ the statement through once (silently).
- Read the statement a second time (outload).
- Pause, between each section and take time to write, doodle, and underline, etc., within that section.⁴
 - Look for a Word or phrase that pops out.
 - Listen for God's action or voice?
 - How does this vision invite ______ to participate in God's grace-filled community⁵?

Closing Prayer

- We pray the Holy Spirit continues moving in life-affirming and healing ways.
- ❖ We pray we have the courage to speak, to engage, to hear, and to follow.
- ❖ We pray that we can be united in our diversity that we can find our commonality in our core the risen Christ⁶, who alone redeems the world!
- ❖ We pray that we will serve boldly and in a way, that heals the wounds of the world and ushers in "Thy Kingdom/Kindom" Come."
- ❖ We pray that we would be **alive** with vivaciousness and a strength that is birthed only through knowing that death will never have the final say, that death becomes a necessary new birth for all who follow Christ.

We pray that God, who alone breathes life, and makes hearts soft would speak with clarity through the Holy Spirit to each who are gathered and to the fullness of the church not present (today)

A word about the 2020 Vision Team's Process

- Using scripture passages as opening exercises, the 2020 Vision team held listening sessions with presbyteries, congregations, synod leaders, groups at the Big Tent, Association of Presbyterian Christian Educators, Seminaries, and with Campus Ministries over a period of fourteen months.
- ❖ After listening sessions across the country, they met for three face-to-face gatherings to assimilate information, pray and listen for God's guidance and direction.
- The team was acutely aware of the time constraints and the deadline of producing information for the 2018 General Assembly. We recognized that our challenge was similar in many ways to what congregations, presbyteries, synods, GA committees, school boards, non-profit leaders, and a variety of other groups face.
- ❖ The words from Habakkuk, "wait for it," provided an adaptive centering, while the team confessed the temptation to default to quick "fix-it" it answers. As they wrestled, they paused to listen.
- Read and listen to the words from Ecclesiastes 3: 1-4 and Psalm 130: 5-6.9
- Reflect on a selection from Kathleen Norris's devotion on Time. 10

Gradually my[our] perspective on time changed.

In our culture, time can seem like an enemy:
it chews us up and spits us out with appalling ease.
But the monastic perspective welcome time a s a gift from God,
and seeks to put it to good use
rather than allowing us to be used up by it...
Liturgical time is essentially poetic time,
oriented toward process rather than productivity,
willing to wait attentively
in stillness, rather than always pushing
to "get the job done."

❖ The team left their last face-to-face, knowing they faithfully listened to the Holy Spirit's guidance, captured the essence of what they heard, and sent their draft Guiding Statement to GA 2018.

For I was hungry and you gave me nothing to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not invite me in, I needed clothes and you did not clothe me, I was sick and in prison and you did not look after me.' "They also will answer, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or needing clothes or sick or in prison, and did not help you?' "He will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me.' "Then they will go away to eternal

punishment, but the righteous to eternal life."

The 2020 Vision Team was mandated by the 222nd General Assembly (2016) and charged with developing a guiding statement for the denomination as it moves into the future.

In the faithful desire to discern the will of God we listened throughout the denomination and beyond, hearing hope and frustration, expectation and anxiety. Along our journey even when it is hard to see the way forward, God has spoken and continues to speak to us in these times and places.

Therefore, God calls the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to be:

Prayerful

- Confessing our sin to God and those we have wronged, we accept our responsibility for the brokenness in the world and in ourselves. In Christ we are assured of forgiveness and freed to forgive others.
- We ask the Holy Spirit to direct and guide us as we actively listen to Scripture and fully engage in the joys and challenges of life in this present world.
- By grace Christ binds us together, cleanses us in the waters of baptism, nourishes us at the Lord's table, and sends us out to share the Good News.

Courageous

- Reformed and always being reformed, we follow the Holy Spirit in new and imaginative ways to places we have not yet been.
- We foster the hope of reconciliation in Christ who transforms the world through healing individuals and communities.
- We work for God's justice and peace for all people in every land, walking with the vulnerable, the marginalized, and the abused.

United

- As members of the Church universal, we are Christ's disciples, called by God and empowered by the Holy Spirit.
- Against forces that seek to divide, Christ compels us to bear witness to a love that connects communities across great differences.
- We approach others in a spirit of openness and trust as we follow Jesus Christ in respecting the freedom of other religions, worldviews, and traditions.

Serving

- Gratefully following the One who washed his disciples' feet, we listen to our neighbors, working to meet their practical needs.
- We partner with others to become the hands and feet of God in the world, showing compassion and generosity to all creation.
